Los Banos City Council considers \$101.6 million annual budget, \$500,000 to furnish new police station

Adopts Military Equipment Use Policy, approves development agreement for 271 homes

During their meeting on Wednesday, June 1, the Los Banos City Council reviewed the proposed budget for Fiscal Year 2022-23 of \$101,584,632 which includes annual deficit of \$2.3 million. But the city will operate with a positive fund balance of \$112,000.

In addition, the council adopted a Military Equipment Use Policy, approved a development agreement with Anderson Homes for 271 singlefamily homes on the west side of town, 5% and 10% increases to the annual Landscape & Lighting District Assessments, adopted a resolution calling and giving notice of the Nov. 8, 2022 city elections, and honored several individuals, a business and a church.

Budget Presentation & Workshop

According to the staff presentation, the budget includes \$250,000 for police department vehicle replacement, patch rebranding at a cost of \$25,000 and \$500,000 to furnish the new police station. Of that amount, \$250,000 will be from of the General Fund and another \$250,000 from Measure P funds. The purchase of a new \$35,000 motorcycle will be from Measure H funds.

The budget for Code Enforcement will increase by \$41,000 for upgrading the animal shelter, microchips and vaccines, and one additional Animal Control vehicle.

An increase in Fire Department spending will include enough funds for

one more firefighter for full staffing at Station 2.

The Streets budget will increase by \$1.5 million to cover the costs of several projects throughout the city.

The Maintenance budget will include \$1.3 million with some of the funds used to replace vehicles from 1994 and 1998. Some of the maintenance workers' time gets distributed to the Lighting and Landscape Districts for a total of \$912,000.

The budget projects receiving federal ARPA funds of \$4.9 million, again in the new fiscal year. Staff is proposing spending a total of \$3.3 million with \$555,000 more for the RAD Card program and \$1.8 million on buildings and structures. The money must be obligated by Dec. 31, 2024 and spent by Dec. 31, 2026.

District 2 Councilmember Refugio Llamas asked about "the funds for the classroom range, will it improve the firing range?"

Police Chief Gary Brizzee responded by saying, "the goal is to be able to hold classes, there" with the addition of a restroom, which it's been without since the facility was first built in the 1970's.

"I'm glad to hear that. It's a long time coming," Llamas responded.

there However, won't be anyimprovements to the firing range, the chief added.

Llamas then asked if signage for some of the parks without signs isincluded in the budget.

"Yes. It's being funded out of See Council p. 8

Avoid contact with water at San Luis Reservoir due to blue-green algae bloom

Boating, fishing allowed but no swimming, don't let pets drink the water

The Department of Water Resources (DWR) is urging the public to avoid contact with water at San Luis Reservoir in Merced County until further notice due to blue-green algae (cyanobacteria).

Boating is allowed, but swimming and other watercontact recreation and sporting activities are not considered safe due to potential adverse health effects. For more information on warning level advisories, go to Harmful Algal Bloom website under Advisory Signs at water. ca.gov/What-We-Do/Recreation/ Algal-Blooms.

Advisories are based on the potential health risks from algae. Exposure to toxic blue-green algae, also known as cyanobacteria, can cause eye irritation, allergic skin rash, mouth ulcers, vomiting, diarrhea, and cold- and flu-like symptoms.

Pets can be especially susceptible because they tend to drink while in the water and lick their fur afterwards. Keep pets away from the water.

Bloom conditions can change rapidly, and wind and waves may move or concentrate the bloom into different regions of the reservoir.

The algal bloom can accumulate into mats, scum, or form foam at the surface and along the shoreline, and range in color from blue, green, white, or brown. circumstances. Common water purification techniques such

State guidelines on cyanobacteria and harmful algal blooms recommend the following precautions be taken in waters impacted by blue-green algae:

• Do not let pets and livestock drink the water, swim through algal blooms, scum, or mats, or lick their fur after going in the water. Rinse pets in clean water to remove algae from fur.

• Avoid wading, swimming, or jet or water skiing in water containing algae blooms, scum, or mats.

• Do not drink, cook, or wash dishes with untreated surface water from these areas under any circumstances. Common water purification techniques such as camping filters, tablets, and boiling do not remove toxins.

• Do not eat shellfish from this water. For fish caught here, throw away guts and clean fillets with tap water or bottled water before cooking.

• Get medical treatment immediately if you think that you, a family member, friend, pet, or livestock might have been poisoned by blue-green algae toxins. Be sure to alert medical professionals to the possible contact with bluegreen algae. Also, make sure to contact the local county public health department.



Council approves 5% and 10% increases to Landscape & Lighting District Assessments

During their meeting Wednesday, June 1, the Los Banos City Council unanimously voted to increase the annual Landscape & Lighting District Assessments for two districts by 5% and the other 16 districts by 10%.

According to the staff report the City currently administers 18 Landscaping and Lighting Districts which provides for the maintenance of certain improvements within each of the districts. The fiscal health of the districts has continually improved over the last 12 years. Fifteen districts maintained a negative fund balance in FY 2009-2010.

However, the ending balance for FY 2022-2023 is estimated to have only two districts with a negative fund balance. This transformation affords staff the ability to plan and schedule the repair and replacement of the infrastructure in the parks and rights-of-way.

Due to existing deficits and/or planned capital improvements, Districts 11 a, 11 b, 11 c, and 12 were increased the maximum 5%, and Districts 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 9, 10, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17a, 17c, 18 and 19 were increased by the maximum of 10%.

No member of the public spoke on the item. Without council discussion, District 4 Councilmember Deborah Lewis moved to approve the assessments, District 3 Councilmember Brett Jones seconded the motion and it passed unanimously.

Measure H funding," Parks and Recreation Operations Manager Joe Heim responded.

The annual budget is expected to be adopted following a public hearing at the council's meeting on June 15, before the new fiscal year begins July 1.

Council Adopts Military Equipment Use Policy

Following a second presentation by Police Operations Commander Justin Melden, the council adopted a Military Equipment Use policy in response to AB 481 which was signed into law, last year. The first presentation was at the meeting on May 18. The council was required to adopt the policy, "prior to the law enforcement agency funding, acquiring, or using military equipment," according to the staff report.

"Every law enforcement agency in the state of California is required to present on this topic," Melden stated. "More than anything, this presentation is to meet a new legal requirement to continue the use of equipment we've been using, in some cases, for decades." Without anyone speaking during the public hearing on the item or discussion by council, District 4 Councilmember Deborah Lewis moved to adopt the ordinance. The motion was seconded by Llamas and it passed unanimously.

"Very good. We need that equipment. Fighting crime, it really is a war, and you really have to be equipped to fight because some of them, they are very well equipped, themselves," Mayor Tom Faria added.

Approve \$25,000 to Cover Costs of November City Elections

As part of the Consent Calendar, the council adopted of a resolution calling and giving notice of the November 8, 2022 City of Los Banos Municipal Election and approved spending \$25,000 to cover the costs.

The positions up for election this fall will be:

Mayor "at-large" for a full term of two years, Council Member for District 2 for a full term of four years, Council Member for District 3 for a full term of four years, City Clerk "at-large" for a full term of four years; and City Treasurer "at-large" for a full term of four years.

During their meeting on June 1, the city council approved a Development Agreement with Anderson Homes for approximately 271 single-family detached residential lots on 70.5 acres. The project is located south of W. Pacheco Boulevard, west of Dock Avenue, and east of the city limit line. According to the staff report, on May 18, 2022, the council approved the Final Development Plan #2021-01 for Quail Meadows at Stonecreek V.

No member of the public spoke during the public hearing, nor were there discussion or questions by council. District 3 Councilmember Brett Jones moved to approve the development agreement, it was seconded by District 4 Councilmember Deborah Lewis, and the motion passed unanimously.
