## District 2 candidate Begonia says council should wait until after election to hire city manager

Los Banos City Council District 2 candidate Doug Begonia, Jr. spoke out, this week about the city manager controversy, saying the current city council should wait until after the election to fill the position, permanently. His sentiments echo what the

only candidate for mayor, Paul Llanez has said previously, as well as Mayor Pro Tem Kenneth Lambert and Councilman Brett Jones, with whom Begonia will serve if he's able to unseat appointed incumbent Refugio LLamas.

Asked if they should wait Begonia

responded, "absolutely. I would like to wait whether I win or my opponent wins, until after Election Day and voters decide who is going to represent District 2."

"Paul is going to get in there, he's going to be the mayor so he should definitely have a say," he continued. "That's because it's so close. If this was a year ago or even six months ago that would be different. The election is only a couple months from now. We should have a say in who the new city manager is going to

Obviously, they're trying to get their guy in there because they don't know what is going to happen on election day," he added.

# Valadao announces campaign receives endorsement of Los Banos Teachers Association one day later

In a post on her Facebook page on September 1, candidate for the Los Banos School Board Trustee Area 7, Dayna Valadao announced her campaign writing, "I have decided to run for a seat on the Los Banos School Board. Education has always been something I hold dear to my heart. I believe it is essential for a school board to perform as a cohesive unit alongside district staff and community members. Effective communication is needed to establish and maintain trust and a common focus. Providing a quality education to all

children within our community will continue to be my priority."

Then on Sept. ation shared on

their Facebook page the retired teacher's post and announced their endorsement of her writing, "LBTA proudly endorses Dayna! Her passion for our community, schools, and children is unmatched! Vote Valadao for LBUSD School Board!"

Asked if she had been interviewed for the endorsement and if she had any comment about receiving the teachers' union support, Valadao responded, "Yes, I am being endorsed by LBTA. I was contacted, and they set up a time to interview me in front of a panel of five members. The interview panel had several questions that I was to answer on the spot. I feel honored to be endorsed by LBTA. As a member for most of my career, they continue to work for the betterment of our teaching staff in a fair and cooperative manner."

"My goal is to run on my own merits," she added.

Her opponent, incumbent Area Trustee Ray Martinez, was also asked if he had been interviewed by the local teachers' union prior to their

endorsement of Valadao. He said he was invited but declined to be interviewed citing previous candidates with various troubles that the union had endorsed and saying the association doesn't share his

"Regarding my campaign and various invites from different organizations to interview with, I will share my thoughts," Martinez responded. "For me, my time, efforts, and logistics to my campaign are precious and priceless. The energy, contacts, collaboration is very valuable to my continued success."

> contacted by LBTA to interview," he shared. "I have been on the board for six years and have only been contacted by LBTA two times for these types of interviews. Even when I served as President of the Board, LBTA never contacted me."

> "In past experience, LBTA has indicated that the union would find a candidate to remove me from the board," Martinez continued. "This same LBTA, in the past. endorsed Dominic Falasco, well known for his addictions, lawsuits, arrests, etc. LBTA endorsed Dennis Areias, convicted of dumping almost 400,000 gallons of toxic waste, potentially endangering, contaminating our water system."

> Why would I subject myself to an interview with the LBTA, knowing that my opponent was recruited to remove me from office?" he asked. "Why would I even consider an endorsement from such an organization that doesn't align itself with values that I hold dearly?"

> "I was never sent a questionnaire by LBTA. The LBTA can endorse whomever

they want. I wish my opponent the best. Competition tends to bring out the best in candidates," Martinez added.

LBTA President Jennifer Wilkin, who is a teacher at R.M. Miano Elementary, was asked about their endorsement and the process. She was asked if her union held candidate interviews of both candidates prior to issuing their endorsement. Wilkin was also asked if so, when and where the interviews were held, who from the union participated, were the candidates asked the same questions, or were they each sent a questionnaire they had to complete. ## 90-year-old Miguel Castro to visit the war memorials

As the nation honors the 20th anniversary of 9/11, we remember those who were lost during the terror attacks and, along with them, the wars that have come before and the thousands of men and women throughout America's history who have served.

One such man, Los Banos resident Miguel Castro, was invited along with 66 other area veterans by the Central Valley Honor Flight organization to visit the war memorials in Washington, D.C.

Castro earned his U.S. citizenship by serving in the Air Force during the Korean War where he worked as part of the foreign training unit to translate for and help teach foreigners who were learning support jobs

such as radar, communications, etc. His ability to translate and communicate as well as to teach was a great aid. Those skills have gone on to support him throughout his life.

Castro is very community oriented, having dedicated over 42 years to teaching Portuguese ESL students, announcing on the radio in Portuguese since 1961 and now transmitting a radio program through radioportugalusa.com, and dedicating countless hours advertising for and working with the Portuguese community in Los Banos. He is definitely one of the heartbeats that keep Los Banos strong and

around the table is just one part of the love for community that Miguel Castro lives and breathes by.

At 90 years old, 91 on November 14, it is truly an honor that Mr. Castro is among us to tell the story of those soldiers lost to the war and to time along with the 66 other

veterans who have been chosen to visit such a sacred and honorable place.

The Central Valley Honor Flight took their first trip in 2013 and has been leading the effort to

honor local World War II, Korean and Vietnam veterans by flying them to see their memorials in the nation's capital ever since. Their website can be found at CVHonor-Flight.org and, to date, the nonprofit has raised over \$2 million to fund 16 flights and has organized 32 send-off and welcome home events. In total, CVHF has transported 706 World War II veterans, 330 Korean War veterans and 27 Vietnam War

Having grown up with strangers approaching him to say that his father helped to teach them throughout community college, Miguel's son, Luis Castro, when asked about his father, responded, "I've been pretty lucky. I've been pretty blessed."

Some of his favorite memories with his father include waterskiing at the San Luis Reservoir and enjoying traditional two-and three-course meals consisting of Portuguese dishes, usually including cod fish as a family staple, lovingly cooked by his mother. The family time spent eating those home cooked meals and sharing laughter

Now, Miguel Castro will join those numbers as he travels with 66 of his fellow veterans aged 65-98 on September 12, 2022, to see the war memorials. This trip honors and remembers their service as they visit the WWII Memorial, the Korean War Memorial, the Vietnam War Memorial and Arlington National Cemetery where they will witness the exchanging of the guard at The Tomb of the Unknown Soldier among other viewing events.

You can be among the many who will welcome back home these honored veterans when they return to Fresno Yosemite International Airport on September 14th.



## Panthers go 1-1, Tigers 1-2 to start off season in non-league games

To start off the year, the Pacheco Panthers lost one and won one game during non-league competition. They lost by just one point to Golden Valley, 19-18 on September 9th. Pacheco ran their whole offense through junior running back, Abel Bravo, who had over 200 yards from scrimmage and a touchdown to carry the offensive load for the Panthers. Their second running back, Abraham Fernandez, added a touchdown as well. Unfortunately, this wasn't enough to beat Central Valley. With only four passes completed, having that strong offensive line and running game can be a strong way to keep them competitive.

On a better note, our Panthers beat Seaside, 29-26 on September 2nd. Bravo had an insane performance for 26 carries, 230 yards (8.8 yards downs. Another running back, Daniel Scott, added a touchdown, as well. The Panthers only had one completed pass. Pacheco looks to advance their record behind their strong running game and sure-fire all-leaguer Bravo.

For our Tigers, they got stung by some Yellowjackets as Los Banos fell to Hilmar, 21-7 on September 9th. They started off scoring, with an incredible punt block scoop and touchdown by number 3, Jamison Braniff. He was probably their best player on the field that night, having a few solid grabs plus that amazing, blocked punt, doing it on both sides for the Tigers.

That was unfortunately the only touchdown for the Tigers, although they came close to scoring a second time with Ayden Barcellos having a great touchdown snag, but the referee

disallowed it.

Credit to the defense for holding their own, although Hilmar QB Hudson Azevedo did have two rushing touchdowns. The **Tigers** defense allowed a lot on the ground that night, which was different from the previous week against

Jamison Braniff, who had an incredible night, caught his first of 3 touchdowns on a pass from Herrera to strike back. From there it was a back-and-forth affair, 19-13 score at halftime. Fast forward to the 4th quarter, the Tigers needed a score, and they drove down to the redzone. Herrera attempted a pass to Braniff for a big play down the sideline, but a great play by the Orestimba corner caused the interception, and ultimately ended the game.

The regular season begins for both teams September 16th.

Bubble tea, or boba tea as it is currently better known here in the US, is the island of Taiwan's most beloved beverage. It started with a combination of cold tea, milk, and brown-sugared tapioca balls named 'bubbles' by the local Taiwanese children in the 1970's or so and has since been the popular choice of refreshment for many generations of

# **Bubble Tea to Boba, the cross-generational Quickly offers refreshing beverage**


ice-cold tea drinkers around the world. Los Banos currently has up to six locations where boba tea is served but they are mostly at our donut and ice cream shops. That changed when Gherlie Arias decided to open her second Quickly boba shop and restaurant in Los Banos in early September after the initial and recent success of her first shop in Atwater.

It should be noted that Quickly was not literally named after the speed of delivery of its specialty iced Asian drinks or tasty food. It is the business name for the now world-famous bubble tea and fried chicken shop that was started by Nancy Yang in Taiwan in 1981 under the trading name Kuai Ke Li, which phonetically translates to 'Quickly'. The business took off and became very popular in Asian tropical islands like the Philippines, for example

Gherlie, an American Filipina, followed her desire to refresh the parched hard-working people of the California Central Valley and at the same time introduce them to some popular and more globally appreciated Asian food.

I first frequented Quickly during its very recent Grand Opening in Los Banos

on a hot summer's day, August 30th. The order lines were literally 'out the door' and the waiting time was forty-five minutes or more. boba fans are very patient and are quite willing to wait up to twenty-five minutes or more for their favorite drink and snack.

The menu has an amazing array of Asian milk teas along with the signature popcorn chicken and my favorite, the Filipino pork lumpia rolls and sweet chili sauce. If you are really lucky, you will find a special and almost hidden menu item, a fried banana dish that is currently not on the Atwater menu and sells out quickly in Los Banos.

After waiting in line and ordering your drink and food, the orders are sent to the back, each beverage is hand-mixed and the food made to order. This allows time for people to socialize in the shop,

develop a thirst, and drink the boba 'quickly' upon receipt. My favorite is the Thai milk tea. Each transparent boba cup is sealed with a straw-pierce able plastic film and the straws are large diameter to accommodate the boba. The popcorn chicken is smaller chunks of white

breast meat coated with a crunchy batter and served with your favorite sauce. Other signature menu items include generous portions of pot stickers and sweet potato fries, and many are hoping the Spam Musubi, an Atwater favorite, will also be added to the Los Banos menu in the future.

Thanks to Gherlie and her team, we now have one more globally recognized beverage and cuisine shop in our Central Valley city.

The Quickly Los Banos is located in the Canal Farm Shopping Center at 1325 E. Pacheco Blvd. Enjoy!

## Merced County Farm Bureau endorses Pazin in Assembly District 27

The Merced County Farm Bureau (MCFB) met with candidates vying to represent Merced County in State Assembly Districts 27 during the August Board of Directors Meeting and former Merced County Sheriff Mark Pazin received the board's endorsement.

This newly formed district will represent the majority of Merced County including all of Los Banos, and parts of Madera and Fresno counties. Following his time as sheriff, Pazin was appointed as law enforcement chief for the California Office of Emergency Services.

Pazin recognizes the regulatory burden for businesses to operate in California is far too high. In addition, he understands the need to invest in long overdue infrastructure to ensure a stable water supply.

When informed of the endorsement, Pazin responded, "Thank you to the Merced County Farm Bureau President and Board of Directors for your endorsement and confidence in me, to not only represent agriculture interests, but the entire district."

"For years we have only witnessed legislative meetings and empty promises to increase water storage, yet not one project started even though financing is available," he continued. "It will take someone with determination and focus to ensure a handful of people do not continually stop these important water storage projects and I am that person."

Following the endorsement, MCFB President Joe Sansoni was satisfied with the direction taken by the board. Sansoni stated, "In reviewing each of the candidates' backgrounds and platforms, we found these candidates aligned the most with the needs of Merced County agriculture."

"We look forward in continuing discussions with them on issues relevant to our membership through the November election," Sansoni added.

It can be easily proven that part of being an American is having a healthy dose of patriot pride and a big part of having patriot pride is honoring the American Flag. Throughout every American battle, war, election and celebration the flag has flown high with those red, white and blue colors standing proud and strong!

Show your patriotism by joining the Flag Program run by the Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 2487 and the American Legion Post 166 wherein, for a yearly fee, an American flag will be placed at your residence or business on the following Flag Service Schedule:

- President's Day February
- Memorial Day May
- Flag Day June 14
- Independence Day July 4
- Labor Day September
- Patriots Day September 11
- Veterans Day November 11

### • Pearl Harbor Day – December 7

Flags will be placed at approximately 6:30 am and will be picked up at approximately 4:30 pm. The fee is \$80 for the first year, which includes the flagpole and the drilling of the hole, and a payment of \$30 every year after. A form, which can be found on their website

www.losbanosveterans.org/ community-service/flag-program/ must be completed and mailed in order to sign up for the program.

Not only are they a big part of the local community, but they are also the only ATLAS Care Center in California. ATLAS is an innovative program that provides telehealth services in order to reduce the need for long travel times to VA facilities.
